## Microchips vs. ID Tags

Many of you that are familiar with rescue know that microchips are used to help us identify our dogs and secure their safety should they land in a shelter. These days there are multiple companies selling microchips versus only two that were considerably well known ten years ago. As with many products, not all are created equal. Some of the cheaper ones do not have any type of "anti-migratory" protection, meaning that there is risk the microchip will travel to an area other than where it was implanted. It is universally known that the proper area to place a microchip for a dog is under the skin between the shoulder blades. If the person doing the scanning is properly trained they will move the scanner in a back and forth motion from one side to the other until a microchip is found. A website used for microchip information is www.microchiplookup.org, which will let you know the manufacturer of that chip and the phone number to call for registration information.

Registration is the key to a successful microchipping program. I would like to encourage each of you to have your pets scanned to not only ensure that they have a microchip, but also to ensure that the microchip has been properly registered.

Itsy's Story

Meet Itsy! She has quite a story... This little girl is 3 lbs and has a very delicate frame. She is a chocolate, smooth coat Chihuahua with a sad history and severe medical issues. We were told she is approximately 7 years old, but she appears several years older, which might just be due to her poor health condition and dental care. Itsy came to CRT from a good Samaritan who found her in a garage sale. Her owner was selling her for \$15 with all her other junk! The woman who brought her to CRT paid the owner just to get Itsy out of that situation, but she couldn't keep her because she already had several of her own Chis.

Not surprisingly, she wasn't spayed or vaccinated, but that was the least of her problems. She had severe dental disease



and several, if not all, of her teeth needed to be pulled out completely. Her breath was awful! Her ears were filthy. She had patellar luxation so she walked like a little bull dog. The vet said they can't be repaired at this point, which is okay because she gets around just fine. None of this was as critical as her biggest issue, which was "bilateral perineal hernias with bladder entrapment".

Some microchip companies have a one time registration fee and others will ask you to register annually. Also call the microchip company and make sure your information is current and up-to-date. If you have moved or your phone number has changed, it needs to be updated. For many of our CRT dogs, we are the first owner and the changes will need to be made through us. Please feel free to contact me directly if you need us to update your information.

Now, for those of you that are thinking that since your pet has a microchip you don't need to worry about an ID tag. WRONG!! You should still ALWAYS have a current ID tag on your pet at all times. If you have a CRT dog, it is required as it is in your adoption contract to maintain current ID on a collar 24/7. Also, if your neighbor finds your pet, they may not know about microchips or how to discover if there is a microchip. Have a current tag so that anyone who finds your pet can call you right away! Heaven forbid, if there is a medical emergency, you will want that person to be able to contact you immediately.

Sometimes I hear people say, "My dog will never get out or get away from me". However, I'm here to say, "what if" your home is burglarized and your pet is turned loose or stolen? "What if" that one time you don't have a collar and ID tag on your pet something completely out of your control happens and your pet runs in a panick so fast you can't even begin to recover them? Things out of our control happen every day. With chihuahuas being the #2 breed euthanized in shelters every day, do you want to run the risk of them landing there and losing them as a result of no ID or outdated ID?

Love your dog enough, to say, I want you home in my arms as soon as possible!!! Get that tag and microchip updated today!!

# Mother's Day **Puppy Rescue**

I had just finished Mother's Day brunch with my family when I received a text message with a picture attached from a phone number I did not recognize. "Someone dumped four Chihuahua puppies in an alley near my home," it read, "can Chihuahua Rescue come and get them?" The picture attached was of four scared Chihuahuas huddled against a fence. I immediately called the man, named Ron, to find out where the Chihuahuas were located.

When he told me the area, I knew immediately where it was – a neighborhood close to my old high school. He was very concerned that we catch the Chihuahuas as soon as possible, as both bobcats and coyotes were frequently seen in the area and some of his neighbors had lost pets to them. I assured him I would be there shortly, and after contacting our then coordinator (now President) Karen Hales to alert her as to what was happening, I headed over there. Ron said he would meet me there.

When I arrived in the alley, it was starting to rain and the Chihuahuas were exactly in the same spot they were in the picture Ron had sent me, huddled up against a fence. They were shivering from the rain, and the largest one, a blonde male, seemed to be their protector. When I stood up to move towards them, the blonde one barked madly and they all scattered. I put some kibble out and went back and sat down. They returned quickly to eat, but if I moved towards them, the blonde one would bark and they all would scatter again. This went on for a while, and at one point, they let me get close enough to grab one of the smaller puppies, but the blonde one got between us. Because of this, we decided to set a trap.

Before I knew it, a little before dark, I received a call from Ron that two of the puppies were in the trap! I rushed over there and the blonde one and another small male were in the trap.

What this basically means is that she couldn't poop properly or regularly, and the fecal matter would gather in the hernias. Her rear end bulged out bigger and bigger until she was finally able to defecate, and it would go down a little but not completely. Imagine a golf ball size bulge on either side of her tail! When she first came to us, she couldn't poop for 5 days in a row! She had to have an emergency procedure to manually remove the fecal matter while under anesthesia.

She was placed on a laxative medication 4 times a day and was eating prescription food. Her dry food was placed in a bowl of water like a soup so that she consumed extra water as she ate. Watching her struggle and strain trying to go was so sad to see... It had to be uncomfortable and probably painful as well.



When she did finally go, it was way too large and firm for her size. She was sent to a

specialist and had several tests to determine the correct plan of action. Her surgery estimate was over \$3,000!! The Board decided that this little girl deserved a chance for a happy,

normal life. She was scheduled for surgery to repair the hernia and get spayed at a specialty hospital. During the surgery, her heart almost stopped, due to the anesthesia, but thankfully the vet was able to save her.

Due to her small size and bone loss, there was a significant chance her jaw could have been broken during the surgery.

She is now healing from her surgeries and looks almost normal! She has had a little trouble, but she is now pooping normally and not struggling constantly with constipation. She is a sweet girl and

loves when she's babied and given attention. She is slowly getting used to being picked up and loves to come up and lay

down on or near her foster family. She was most likely abused because she cowers away when approached. She also flattens herself on the floor when someone attempts to pick her up and cries in fear. She has a hysterical move where she does an "army crawl" - her body totally flattened out on the bed or couch, and she crawls forward and backward repeatedly! She also throws her head back like a wolf and howls! Her foster

mom has never had a dog that did this, but now all of her dogs start howling when Itsy does. She has an entire pack of miniature wolves. Her total vet bill equaled close to \$6,000, and CRT is seeking Best Friends for Itsy to help pay for her medical care. Her cute, little personality is blossoming, and

The blonde one was causing quite a ruckus, barking up a storm. The small puppy came out of the trap without any problem, but the blonde one put up quite a fight with Ron, earning him the name Tyson! I decided the other one would be called Tex.

With Tex and Tyson safely in my car, I helped Ron set the trap again, this time in a backyard. With the help of one of his neighbors we tried one more time to corral the two remaining puppies, but very quickly realized to catch them they too would have to go into the trap. It was dark and raining when I left the alley to take Tex and Tyson to Karen's house.

Once Tex and Tyson were safe at Karen's house, we could see that they were in good shape and had been



cared for before they were dumped. Tyson was still very protective of Tex if you got too close, and the sound of his barking inside the house was almost ear splitting! Tex was unsure of what was



happening, but had a very sweet demeanor. Very early the next morning I received a call from Ron that there was a puppy in the trap, but the other puppy, the smallest of the four, had been attacked by a bobcat but was still alive (he had also found a fifth puppy that was deceased due to a bobcat attack). I rushed over there and what I saw in that backyard was heartbreaking – a small male Chihuahua, soaking wet from the rain, laying injured on the grass. I could see the puncture wounds on his neck and chest. He was in shock. I gently wrapped him in a towel and placed him in a carrier. The Chihuahua in the trap was a female.

## From Puppy Mill to Paradise

On May 16, 2016, a property on Hilton Head Island in South Carolina was raided and 68 dogs and 5 cats were found, living in filth, as shown in the photo on page 7. There were 6 breeds being housed in these deplorable conditions – Chihuahuas, Pomeranians, Shelties, Schnauzers, Cocker Spaniels and Miniature Pinchers. On June 16th, CRT was asked to assist with 18 Chihuahuas, including a mother Chi and 3 puppies. As usual, CRT was scrambling for space for these refugees, and we just did not have space for all. We put out a request to other reputable rescues and asked for help. Animal Rescue & Foster Program in Greensboro, NC, Adopt4Love Pets, Inc. in Carthage, NC and The Humane Society of North Myrtle Beach, SC all stepped up and helped by taking some of the now 20 Chihuahuas.

She was frightened, but unharmed. I decided to call the female Raina. The injured male would be Ronnie, in honor of Ron, who cared so much about the welfare of four dumped Chi puppies he not only reached out to Chihuahua Rescue for help, but also worked very hard to help us trap them. I loaded Raina and Ronnie into the car and sped off to the vet.

Once we arrived, the vet started working on Ronnie immediately and was amazed he had survived the bobcat attack, as his wounds were "kill wounds." And while it was touch and go the first few days, Ronnie made an incredible recovery! Ron texted me every day to check on Ronnie's progress during his recovery, and many of Ron's neighbors contributed generously to help cover Ronnie's vet bills!

Urban wildlife roams most of our neighborhoods and though you may never see a coyote or bobcat (or hawk or owl), they are there and pose real dangers to your unattended pets when they are

understand why, if someone could no longer care for these puppies, they thought dumping them in an alley was an acceptable solution. If not for a kind-hearted man like Ron reaching out to Chihuahua Rescue, four little Chis would have met cruel fates in that alley. Our southeastern coordinator and volunteer coordinator headed down to Hilton Head on June 25th, stopping to pick up another Chi (found locked in the bathroom of a trailer with no electricity or running water in the summer heat) from a shelter along the way. When they finally arrived at the Hilton Head Humane Association Spay & Neuter Clinic, there were two more Chi's in kennels waiting at the front door that they just couldn't leave behind (one being a rather large, 13-yearold Chi named Kaylo who ended up being adopted by his foster family).

They headed back to North Carolina with 21 Chihuahuas! One female, designated #50, was approximately 8 years old, non-spayed with dental disease, heartworms and scars on both flanks. She was such a sweet and loving girl that we decided to call her Precious. Precious had a second heartworm test to confirm her positive status and began her three month long treatment. Once free of heartworms, she was spayed, had a dental and was ready for adoption. Precious was placed in one of our foster homes to learn how to be a member of the family, working on home skills and walking on a leash. A few weeks

later, the SE coordinator was contacted by CRT alumni who had recently lost both of their Chi's to old age. They wanted to adopt again, but now lived in Massachusetts.

Bonnie was moved on to permanent lock up. Clyde had to be recaptured! Attempts to get Clyde into custody went on for over a week — posters and flyers were posted and distributed in the neighborhood and the adjoining golf course. Sightings were reported! From gathered reports, it was determined that Clyde was an experienced Chihuahua felon. People reported rubbing his belly but, as soon as they attempted to leash him or pick him up, he showed his teeth with obvious intent to use them.

On the following weekend, more than a week after his escape, the southeastern

coordinator rounded up a posse, including an experienced lost cat detective, hotdogs and a van driver. The apprehension of Clyde began. He led the posse across the golf course... the lost cat lady lay on the ground offering hot dogs, a temptation Clyde could not ignore... but when he was nibbling the hotdogs from her fingers, she realized she only knew techniques for cat grabbing!! WOW! Has another year gone by again? The CRT southeastern region has been super busy when it comes to helping out needy Chihuahuas this year. We have gained many new volunteers and now have a volunteer coordinator, application and information processor, data spreadsheet processor, microchip data processor and two volunteers who send hand-made thank you cards to people who donate money to CRT. We also have lead coordinators in the Raleigh/Cary area of NC as well as in Wilmington, NC. Our transport volunteers are ready, at the drop of a hat, to get a dog or dogs from point A to point B. We also have a Facebook team that helps promote our dogs or anything that is happening in the southeast. In summary, our volunteers in the southeastern region ROCK!

Our numbers for adoptions this year reached 86 adoptions, more than double what we did last year, and we received 209 applications. We still need more foster volunteers so, if you've been thinking about fostering, take that leap and become a foster for one of the too many Chi's that are out there and need help. CRT will pay for all vet costs and you just pay for food and any treats that you may want to give them. Your role as a foster is



to make the dog part of your family, paper train or house break the dog and teach them to walk on a leash. Unfortunately I'm still having to turn away between 8-12 Chi's PER DAY that we are being asked to take, due to lack of places to put them.
