When she first came to us she was so obese that she could not even walk!!!! With the weight loss we can see that part of her dilemma is the deformity of her back legs. Now the question remains, "Was she born like that or was it created?" We may never know. But, she now can walk, albeit, a bit slow.

Ariel has been SO grateful to be with us. She is very loving. She loves humans, and loves her Chihuahua brothers and sisters. She tries so hard to get into the pack and play with them. She enjoys playing with toys. She loves to be petted (so we bribe her to walk over to us to get some loving!). She wags her tail and looks up at us with loving eyes. Now just because I had all these different jobs didn't mean that my love of animals stopped. During this time I had a Schnauzer named Sam, a Blue-Crowned Conure, a Minah bird and several pet rats.

My mom got sick so I moved back to Winston-Salem, NC to help out with her care. During this time I worked for a mattress manufacturing company then got a job at Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center (WFBMC) in Pediatrics Medical Genetics. After moving back to Winston-Salem, I became involved with a wildlife rehabilitation group called Wildlife Rehab, Inc. (WRI). Here I learned how to care for injured and orphaned wildlife and eventually taught others how to do this through classes at the local community college. I fell in love with raptors, got my federal rehab permit and then my education permit and now have a state and federal license for a 42-year-old turkey vulture, a black vulture, 2 red-tailed hawks, a barred owl, two screech owls, a great horned owl and a peregrine falcon. At the same time I also had a non-releasable skunk and opossum, as well as numerous snakes (black rat, eastern king, copperhead, corn and ball python), a pair of emperor scorpions, a rose haired tarantula, an aquarium of Madagasgar Hissing Cockroaches and 15 tropical rescue parrots. Everything except the rescue parrots were used in environmental education programs in schools, state parks, scout meetings, church groups, etc.

I also started rescuing dogs and this is when I first found out about CRT. It took 6 months of me bugging Lynnie before the board agreed to allow me to be a volunteer and soon after they made me coordinator. My family home was now home to several foster dogs and at one time, after a puppy mill bust that CRT was asked to assist with, I had 65 dogs in runs and cages in my garage. Thank goodness most of them only stayed overnight and were picked up by different rescue groups the next day.

By networking with other rescues, we were able to assist with several large puppy mill busts or hoarding situations, placing 100's of dogs into better environments and living situations.

Can you see now why I'm not married?:0) After 14 years at WFUMC, the doctor that I worked for decided that she wanted to do research; so, she moved to Duke University Medical Center (DUMC). I was told that I could continue in my present position for six months and then they would "reevaluate me," which I knew meant that I wouldn't have a job so I also transferred to Duke. The wildlife stayed behind in Winston-Salem when I moved to Timberlake, NC so that WRI could continue to do their education programs. The Chi's came with me. I now have just rescue Chihuahuas and a couple of rescue Chinese Crested dogs. My personal dogs consist of a couple of Chihuahuas named Emma and Stinky, a three-legged Chinese Crested named Barbie and a six month old, white, deaf Boxer named Ellie Mae.

I love taking care of the animals that come across my path whether permanently or the ones that just pass thorough. I continue to rescue wildlife in Person County and recently rescued my first eagle this year.

Chihuahuas are a special breed of dog that are now the second most euthanized dog in shelters across the United States. CRT needs more foster volunteers so that we can rescue even more dogs out of shelters. # Learning More About Pet Allergies

With the arrival of warmer weather, allergies may come to the forefront. Allergies are frustrating for both clients and for their pets. Allergies are defined as a hypersensitivity to a generally harmless allergen in which an individual's body overreacts or has an abnormal response. They may be the result of an environmental source, food sensitivity or external parasites. In most pets, allergies tend to manifest as skin issues, specifically chronic or recurrent skin/ear infections, redness in areas and itching.



Environmental allergens may be things inhaled during the warmer weather such as pollen of grasses, trees, and weeds. It may also come from things found in the household such as dust mites and mold spores. Just as in humans, these allergens can be tested for using an intradermal test (where small areas of skin are pricked and the substance is introduced to see if it incites a reaction) or a blood test. The results of these tests result in formulation of a special injection for your pet to aid in reduction of abnormal allergic responses.

Food allergies are the result of a hypersensitivity to either the protein source or the carbohydrate source found in your pets food. It may also be a reaction to the dyes or the preservatives found in many foods. Diagnosis of a sensitivity and confirmation of the source involves feeding a strict diet, generally a prescription diet prescribed by your veterinarian, and fed for a period of 12-16 weeks. If the pet improves on the diet, some veterinarians recommend feeding the source in question and monitoring for itching.

Flea allergies are a common source of irritation. A misconception is that a pet must be infested to have an abnormal reaction. It only takes a few flea bites to incite an itchy reaction. Often, fleas may not be found but the recommendation is to apply a flea product consistently.

Addressing the allergens responsible for your pets' condition is important, but it is also necessary to treat any secondary infections.

Many pets have secondary skin and ear infections from itching and licking the itchy areas. Appropriate medications and topical products, such as shampoos and sprays, can be prescribed by your veterinarian.

Frustrating for most owners is the knowledge that allergies cannot be cured, but must be managed. Management comes from avoidance strategies, prescription medications/ sprays/shampoos/diets as well as application of flea products. Life long management improves your pets quality of life and may involve antihistamines or even steroids to suppress the abnormal immune response. If you suspect your pet has allergies, I strongly encourage a trip to your veterinarian to address your pets individual needs.
